### President's Message

#### Fall is officially here!

Cooler temperatures are on the way and that means getting ready to bring your outdoor plants back inside. Thankfully this can be done in stages as some plants are definitely more tolerant of cool conditions than others.

Start by preparing your indoor or greenhouse spaces with a thorough cleaning. Remove debris and dead leaves, clean and sanitize surfaces, clean windows or greenhouse panels for maximum light transmission, and make sure your lights, fans, timers, etc.. are tested and ready to go. It's also a good time to consider making upgrades to your growing space.

And once you're ready to move plants, begin with tender, more tropical orchids like Phalaenopsis and Vandas. These should generally be kept 60 degrees or above at night, but two to three weeks of "cool" fall nights dipping into the mid 50's will improve flowering. But "cool" is relative. Temperatures below 50 degrees can be detrimental.

On the other end of the cold-tolerance spectrum are nobile-type Dendrobiums and cool-growing Cymbidiums. These can take temperatures into the 30's. Both need cool nights for best flowering, so can be left outdoors well into October or even early November depending on how sheltered they are from

frost and precipitation. These will be the last plants to come inside.

Of course, you need to do some research and determine what's right for your particular plant, especially if you're growing species. For example, most Cattleyas will tolerate temps down into the upper 40's, but warm to hot growing species like luteola or violacea would suffer. And while most Phalaenopsis species and hybrids will be fine with night time temperatures in the 50's, lowland, warm-growing species like violacea and "novelty" hybrids should stay above 60 degrees at night.

#### General tips:

Cool and dry is better than cool and wet. Protect plants from cold, damp conditions which will encourage disease. Make sure leaves, and especially sheaths, buds, and crowns, dry before cool night temperatures settle in.

Take advantage of micro-climates. Shelter plants near buildings and walls that absorb and radiate heat at night and block cold winds. Covering your outdoor growing area with shade cloth or row cover fabric will also trap heat radiating up from the ground and can help protect plants from wind.

While dips in night time temperatures can be good for inducing seasonal blooms, day time temps should still warm up into the 70s for warm-growing plants. Once temperatures are forecast to dip below 70 degrees for an extended period it's time to start moving your most tender plants inside.
